About ShadowTech24

Background

ShadowTech is a TechWomen initiative that has been running since 2014. The first ShadowTech Day gave young women in years 9–11 the chance to shadow a tech professional for a day.

In 2021 the ShadowTech program evolved to focus on secondary school teachers to widen the impact of the programme.

Following a two year hiatus due to the pandemic, ShadowTech recommenced in 2023.

ShadowTech24 has been the biggest year to date with a 60% increase in student participation. More than 1000 secondary school girls experienced the tech industry, spending a day at leading tech companies nationwide, as part of ShadowTech24, which ran from 6–14 September.

For one day, students in years 9–11 were given the opportunity to discover the world of tech, spark their curiosity and explore career pathways.

ShadowTech24, delivered by TechWomen and supported by NZTech, saw nearly 90 organisations in Hamilton, Cambridge, Wellington, Tauranga, Christchurch, Dunedin, Gisborne, Timaru and Auckland take part in the initiative.

Students were matched with local tech companies and gained first hand experience to imagine their future career. Their day-long visits included workplace tours, meeting the team and workshop activities. ShadowTech is a fantastic opportunity for students to experience the wide range of career opportunities available to them in the tech sector.

Half of the New Zealand population is female, but a recent NZTech survey (<u>Digital Skills</u> <u>Aotearoa: Edition 3</u>) found that women make up only 29 per cent of the country's digital IT workforce.

This diversity challenge begins in education, with females making up only 40% of NCEA technology students and 24% of IT graduates.

Programs like this help break down barriers and myths some girls have that tech is 'boring' and 'for boys.'

Teachers
